First Step Early Intervention Centre

We held the biggest graduation ceremony in the 14 year old history of First Step Centre last November when we bid farewell to 19 of our five and six year olds. Thirteen children were from the Gelugor centre and six others came from the Seberang Jaya centre. This was also the first graduation for the SJ Centre since we started this branch in 2008.

This grand party was organised by the parents of the graduating children in the ballroom of Copthorne Hotel with almost 200 family members and friends in attendance.



Respite Care Support Centre

We held a successful holiday programme last November for 13 children (10 special needs plus three siblings) with the help of nine volunteers on rotation basis. Activities such as bread making, art and craft, gardening, water play and a visit to the nutmeg factory, kept the children occupied and the adults on their toes!

Starting 2012, we have decided to offer full day respite care on Saturdays to enable parents to have a longer break. However the number of children that we can take will depend on the number of committed volunteers that we can get.

Please do let us know if you can give us some time on Saturdays on a regular basis, even if it is just a couple of hours. Parents, particularly those who have children with severe disabilities need a break for them to regain back some energy.

Jom Mobile Toy Library

This mobile toy library project has enabled us to reach out to approximately 200 children with multiple disabilities in the rural community. The grant that we received from Sejati and Bakti early last year in supporting the visits has run out. We are seeking for sponsorships and financial support to enable us to continue our activities; otherwise we may be forced to scale down the project.

Play is so vital for all children. Everybody enjoys fun times. At one of the places that we go to, some of the young adults with severe disabilities just enjoy the human touch. So our team provides amateurish manicure, pedicure, facial and massage services too!!

Stepping Stone Work Centre

Our members have flourished and blossomed over the year. Izwan and Izzudin have both found jobs in open employment – one in a hotel and the other in a canteen.

Keeping them successfully in open employment requires a liaison person or a job coach. There are many still sitting at home that we are challenged yet again to look into this needful area. In July, five Mutiara Voice Self Advocacy Club members with one supporter travelled by public transport to Teluk Intan to participate in the 4th National Self Advocacy Conference. Shahell, the current President of Mutiara Club has started travelling outstation on his own to give talks and challenge other groups to start their own self advocacy clubs.

I must admit that five years ago, it would have been difficult to stretch our imagination to the events described above. When they become a reality, you suddenly realise that the seeds planted years ago have not been in vain. This transition to adulthood is exciting. Such encouragement is what keeps us going.

Merdeka Charity Carnival

Our Chairman Dato Gillian Teh helmed the organising of the massive Merdeka Charity Carnival 2011 which was held in the concourse of the Penang International Sports Arena on 27th August 2011.

We organised this in partnership with Engtek Community Service and JCI Pearl. With the good support from Hong Leong Foundation and the generosity from the public, we raised almost half a million ringgit. One third of it was further distributed out to bless 13 other NGOs and schools in Penang.



The Chief Minister of Penang honoured us with his presence and he even took part in the CEO's Rat Race by 'running' in wooden clogs.

In return, their lecturers Dr Thana Singarajah, Dr Kelli Saginak and Ms Jennifer Kerner ran several training workshops for the people in Penang.

Our team continues to participate in community events such as various environmental green carnivals, artisans market and an accessibility tourism event in KL.

We are glad to have had Nicholas Forster, a GAP student volunteer from Melbourne stay with us for two months from July-Sept last year. Last September was a hospitality month for us as we hosted 15 Occupational Therapy students from Yonago, Japan for a week's placement; a group of 40 delegates from the YMCA Asia Pacific Region; as well as welcomed individuals and busloads of visitors during our Open House.

Last December, we hosted and organised a four-day regional meeting for 20 social welfare workers from South East Asia.
