Independent Living – Risk or Adventure?

I shared with you some time ago on how two of our members, Izwan and Sabri are enjoying independent living together in a small kampung house just within walking distance from the ACS Stepping Stone Work Centre.

They manage the house themselves, so you just need to imagine a bachelors' house. They pay all the dues and blend very well into the community. In early May, we got into a frenzy when Izwan went missing for 12 hours. Police reports were made; photos circulated. Izwan did not pick up his mobile phone because he was obedient to the work rules of not answering phone calls during working hours.

When we finally got through to him in the evening, he was somewhere on the mainland of Penang! Apparently he left with a stranger whom he had met during his rounds of recycling collection. He finally returned safely at 9pm.

This incident forced us to reflect on this whole issue of independent living. Should our programme change? Is there any way we could have prevented such an incident? Could we have given more supports? Did we panic more than Izwan? Should Izwan be 'punished'? Who should take responsibility?

Well, independent living is about freedom of choice, which comes with one's own responsibility. There are elements of risks in everything new we do. Nothing venture, nothing gained. It was probably a whole adventure for Izwan.

At the end of the day, should we deprive people with intellectual disabilities of this quality of life? Should we continue to shelter them in a protective environment?

Independent living celebrates PWDs living a higher quality of life. In ACS, we will continue to empower our members and pray to God for safety and protection over all His children each and every day.

For many of our members with intellectual disabilities, they are often not given enough opportunities for such exposures. Families tend to protect them too much; care-givers tend to instruct them too much.

There is also a general misconception that just because they are slow, these people cannot think, and therefore we need to provide them with all the answers and tell them what to do all the time!

The members can determine for themselves what they like or dislike. They are then empowered to make informed choices. Sometimes their choice may not be our choice. And we need to learn to respect their decision so long as it is not harmful or life threatening. What is unforgiveable or unacceptable is to deny them of such excitement and opportunities.

We are thankful to Ineke Proesman, our Belgian student for focussing on the independent living project during her 3 month placement with us. She provided opportunity for some of our new members to stay away from home to experience functional skills for living in the community.

In April, members of the Mutiara Voice Self Advocacy Club organised an overnight camping trip at the Teluk Bahang Forest Park. With some assistance from volunteers, the members arranged everything from activities to meals and tents all on their own. The strong helping the weak; the way the peer group supported and respected each other is truly commendable.

Sure there were moments of ups and downs. But the whole adventure itself was thrilling and exciting. It is exactly the same type of feeling that we all get whenever we plan for such events.
